Foreword - Chief Executive

As you will be aware, North Lanarkshire is making a major contribution to the ongoing humanitarian crisis, by bringing up to 200 homes back into use on a temporary basis, to help those families escaping conflict in Ukraine.



The temporary homes in Coatbridge and Wishaw are being provided in residential towers formerly earmarked for demolition and will enable people escaping from the conflict to live in a safe, welcoming environment for a sustained period if required.

These homes will play a vital role in ensuring these families, who are mostly women and children, establish both a sense of place and community. A bespoke welcome and information pack has been produced to provide a gateway to accessing vital information on Housing and other local services such as Health, Education and Employment. Amongst these families, are teachers, social workers, carers etc. and they want to make a contribution to North Lanarkshire and its communities.

As well as the humanitarian crisis caused by the war in Ukraine, we are all also seeing its wider impacts land here at home, which, when combined with other developments, has created a cost-of-living crisis the likes of which many have never seen before in their lifetimes.

We are working to face these challenges head on by making sure help and advice is available for people struggling to pay their bills as food, energy and other costs of living continue to rise. This is in addition to the direct support we are providing to those homes worst affected. New online tools can be accessed to create a budget or conduct a benefits check and staff are also available to offer support and advice around debt and money worries. Whilst we are doing everything we can, we recognise that this is still not enough, and we need all to work together to help each other get through the tough times ahead.

On a more positive note, we continue to make excellent progress towards our target to deliver 5,000 new homes by 2035, and with our 954 new homes now completed, we are fast approaching our 1,000th new build milestone. A further 413 houses are currently under construction and we continue to identify more sites in town centres and on tower reprovisioning sites as part of the wider regeneration programme which is transforming North Lanarkshire.

Our innovative "Net Zero" project in Holehills, Airdrie, sees the creation of 150 homes, 19 of which will be net zero homes with enhanced sustainability standards. Inventive measures will include air source heat pumps, additional solar panels producing up to 4kw of electricity whilst reducing Co2 emissions and the installation of battery storage units to store electricity generated from the panels thus providing the home's priority source of electricity.

In addition, the open market and empty homes purchase scheme, which is supported by the Scottish Government has now brought back 576 extra council homes for rent since its launch in 2018. And there's good news for the last remaining owners in blocks of flats too as recent changes to the scheme mean they can apply to sell their home back to the council and potentially remain as a council tenant, making investment works to the whole block the council's responsibility.

Finally, it's great to be able see a return to in person events. Our tenants conference will be back this year on the 26th November in Airdrie Academy, bigger and better than ever and I hope many of you will be able to attend. As a council we are totally committed to offering as much choice as possible to get involved and share your views at a time and in a way that suits you best.

Foreword



Welcome to this new edition of the tenants' newsletter. In this issue you will hear how we are making a positive difference to people's lives by working with our tenants and local communities.

A key interest for me is in the delivery of new quality, sustainable and affordable homes and I've been able to visit many new build sites across North Lanarkshire. It's truly inspiring to see the progress already made towards our target of 5,000 new homes by 2035 and our plans for the future taking shape.

The new homes being built at Dykehead in Airdrie are of a high standard and will

provide wonderful homes for the people who move into them. I was particularly interested in the net zero pilot project at this development, which is the first step towards more affordable, energy-efficient homes for North Lanarkshire. Of the 150 new houses being built 19 of these are to be 'net-zero' emission homes. These enhanced sustainability homes will have additional solar panels, battery storage and air source heat pumps. The measures are designed to reduce energy costs for the tenant, help keep carbon emissions low and help towards tackling fuel poverty, a critical aim amidst the current cost of living crisis.

It's good to know too that all our new build homes provide for varying needs which means they are adaptable and accessible, with ten per-cent of all properties specifically designed to be wheelchair friendly and all will incorporate dementiafriendly measures. It's great to see tenants settling into new homes at some of our most recently completed developments including two developments in Wishaw; Roberts Street and Burnhall Place.

With summer already over our garden competition for tenants is now closed and we have some very worthy winners. Judging took place last month by members of the North Lanarkshire Federation and you will be able to see for yourself later in the newsletter just how beautiful these gardens are and the huge amount of effort tenants are putting in to keep their gardens beautiful.

I am very proud of the progress that we have seen so far in all our ambitious plans and will continue to work with our communities and partners to deliver real change and improvements to people's lives.

Making a house a home

As we progress our new house building programme, more tenants are moving into and enjoying the modern features of our new homes.

We're undertaking one of the largest new council house building programmes which will deliver 5,000 new council homes for rent by 2035. And recent completions see us move ever closer to the milestone of our 1,000th new build home.

A further 137 new homes were completed in the last financial year (21/22), across four sites: Caledonian Avenue, Bellshill; Dimsdale Road, Wishaw; Roberts Street, Wishaw and Lismore Drive, Coatbridge.

All our new homes are built to a very high standard and include Housing for Varying Needs, meaning they adapt to suit future needs of our tenants and are Secure by Design, improving safety and security. We're also building highly energy efficient homes as we embrace new, renewable technologies and include features such as solar panels and vehicle charging points, making our homes comfortable and more affordable.

Mr Alexander and Mrs Elizabeth Bissett are enjoying life in their new home at Burnhall Place. They said: "We moved here from one of the towers that was demolished in Gowkthrapple. We love our new home and are really pleased with all its modern features."

And Mr Terence and Mrs Ann Mullen are delighted with their new home at Roberts Street. They added: "We lived in our previous property for 20 years and were really looking forward to moving into the Roberts Street development. We've settled in well and love being part of the local community."

We've secured many other sites for our new homes, including several town centre area sites and development of land linked to our tower re-provisioning programme, and currently have 413 homes under construction.

Head of Housing Solutions, Stephen Llewellyn, commented "Our new homes are changing lives and transforming our local communities as well are delivering jobs, community benefits and boosting the local economy. We're committed to improving the lives of our residents and regenerating local communities to make North Lanarkshire the place to live."

Cost of living help is available

With household bills rising at unprecedented rates, winter approaching and money worries at a high, help is available.

A new online budget tool and advice page has been launched to help residents get practical advice and support. You can complete a benefit check or create a budget plan at our one stop information page **northlanarkshire.gov.uk/ hardship**, it has details too on saving energy, applying for clothing and free school meals and other sources of help.

Our Tackling Poverty Team (formerly the Financial Inclusion Team) is also here to help and provides free and confidential advice in relation to benefits and debt advice for residents of North Lanarkshire. The team can carry out a benefit check to ensure your income is maximised as well as assisting with benefit application and challenging benefit decisions. The team can also help if you are worried about debt or struggling to manage your money. They can provide budgeting advice and help you take the first steps to gain control of your finances by giving advice on reducing outgoings and maximising income. This could help you avoid debt, reduce the risk of unexpected costs and perhaps even have some money left to save. It can also help alleviate the stress of dealing with your creditors.

Home buying scheme extended to private landlords

For the first time under our open market purchase scheme, we will now consider buying homes from private landlords and allowing the tenant to remain in the home as a council tenant, this will help prevent homelessness and increase the council's housing stock.

Benefits of our open market purchase scheme to sellers include no estate agency fees, no home reports being required, no chain of sellers and no viewers. The scheme, which has delivered nearly 600 additional council homes for rent since April 2018, is supported by the Scottish Government.

It enables us to purchase properties that are for sale on the open market, many of which were former council houses previously purchased under right to buy scheme. And in some circumstances we will also purchase properties from owners in blocks of flats, where all the other flats are already owned by the council, and allow them to stay in their homes as tenants. This will make it easier for us to progress investment works for the benefit of everyone living in the block.

Councillor Heather Brannan-McVey, Convener of Housing said: "This scheme has been really successful in recent years and by expanding it to private landlords, we hope to be able to attract additional sellers and provide more homes for council tenants to rent in our communities.

"The housing market has been difficult over the last few years with the pandemic and cost of living crisis affecting sellers, but we hope that by extending our scheme, we can purchase and deliver more homes in areas where there is demand for that type and size of property.

- styling options so the colour scheme, text, font size and spacing can be adjusted
